




game.

on 4th February. They raised £1661 collectively. £831 for CHAS charity and £830 to be split between teams.



## FOOTBALL IRRITATIONS

The popular Football Clichés podcast has a regular feature whereby famous guests reveal their three loves and irritations of football. In a nod to Desert Island Discs it is wittingly entitled Mesut Haaland Dicks, with a certain panache for obscure gems of the beautiful games. Obviously, I'm never going to be a future guest, but that doesn't stop me from having my own niche delights and frustrations of football which I'll deconstruct today.

### LOVE 1: UNDESERVED LATE WINNERS

There are few sweeter feelings as a football fan than your team scoring a late winner. This season Alloa supporters have been spoilt with an abundance of late winners, from Bradley Rodden's 87th minute effort versus Montrose, Luke Donnelly's 93rd minute decisive strike versus Clyde, Scott Taggart's ice-cool 92nd minute penalty at Open Goal Broomhill and a trademark header from Ross MacIver in the 86th minute at Queen of the South last month. However, the cherry on top for me is when your team scores a late winner that they unquestionably do not deserve on the balance of play. The feeling of an undeserved late winner truly is a delight, with perhaps only MacIver's strike fitting within that category for Alloa this season. In seasons gone by though Alloa have specialised in nicking late goals to secure an unlikely win or point,

especially when playing in the Championship. The one which still springs immediately to my mind was lordan Kirkpatrick's 93rd minute winner at Palmerston Park in 2019, with sheer joy in the players faces that they'd pulled off a result they seldom deserved to end a run of five straight defeats. That was replicated on the terraces, as I was amongst the 41 Alloa supporters who made the long journey that day and were rewarded for our efforts in

dramatic circumstances with an against-the-odds winner!

### LOVE 2: PHANTOM HEADERS

I covered this topic within the matchday programme a couple of years ago, but one of my all-time niche delights of football is when you see a manager on the sidelines so invested in the game that they give out an involuntary reflex of heading the ball the millisecond before a player connects with a long cross on the pitch. It is a reaction many fans on the sidelines have too, as for a moment you transport yourself into the boots of your centre-forward as they stretch every muscle to get onto an inviting deep cross. Your brain has enough time to see what is about to happen and vou can't help vourself imagining to head the ball in yourself, as if you are willing the ball into

pletely natural reaction. although of course you know it obviously isn't you six yards from goal with the ball coming your way to score. Last month I'm pretty sure I jerked my head forward the microsecond before Conor Sammon headed home both his goals versus Edinburgh, with both coming from long inviting cross which were perfect for a headed goal. I apologise to everyone I've ever sat or stood near and bumped into as a result of involuntarily motioning what should be happening on the pitch. It is a completely unrehearsed movement, but brings a tremendous smile to my face whenever I see a replay of, for example, lürgen Klopp, reacting to long cross with a phantom header of his own on the touchline. It is endearing and if you're not already aware of this phenomenon, I urge you to keep a

the net. It is a com-

close eye out for it when watching games on TV or yourself doing them during games.

### LOVE 3: IRONIC CHEERS

Being a supporter on the sidelines there are few things I enjoy more than ironically cheering a situation. The referee giving your side a free kick after missing the obvious three previous fouls, an opposition's star striker firing a shot out of the ground, the usually cultured midfielder overhitting a pass out of play, a clumsy defender slicing the ball out for an unexpected corner. The scenarios are endless and I literally love them all. I realise that me taking joy out of someone else's misfortune probably says a lot about me as a human being, but no psychologist can take away that little bit of extra glee of things going in your favour, or something out of the ordinary happening which is mildly amusing and adds to the entertainment of the afternoon. Tell me a football fan that doesn't enjoy it when the opposing fans think they've scored and are celebrating wildly, only for that joy to turn to despair as they see the assistant's flag to rule out the goal - cue the ironic cheers from the opposing fans (or perhaps cheers of relief in that particular instance!) - this is what football is all about and

I wouldn't want it any other wav!

### IRRITATION 1: REF-EREES NOT PLAYING INJURY TIME WHEN THE RESULT IS BEYOND DOUBT

My first irritation of football may sound somewhat inconsequential and petty, but it really annoys me when referees fail to add on injury time at the end of matches simply because the outcome of the game is already beyond doubt. It seems as if referees have their own unwritten rule that they will only ever add on the correct additional time if the scoreline is level or there is a goal or two in it. Beyond that, if a team is three goals or more ahead, it appears to me that referees simply don't apply the rules they are in other areas they are only too happy to follow to the letter. There might be a cursory one minute, or two added minutes if you are really lucky, but when the result if bevond doubt you seldom see more than two added minutes played.

This season there was 90 seconds added on when Alloa won 4-1 at Buckie, 65 seconds at the conclusion of Alloa 5 Peterhead 0 and 60 seconds during Alloa's 5-1 triumph over Queen of the South. Willie Collum took things to a new level at the end of the recent Darvel's recent Scottish Cup exit



to Falkirk, adding precisely 5 seconds beyond the 90 minutes, one for each goal the Bairns scored on the night. I can see that there is a degree of the referee putting the losing side out of their misery, or potentially preventing player injury if for example a show-boating winger takes the ball to the corner flag to count down the clock and potentially encounters a frustrated opponent keen to serve out some retribution, but not adding on the correct additional time still doesn't sit easy with me.

During league games the winning side could lose out of five minutes playing time, whereby they could have scored a goal or two more to improve their goal difference, which could prove crucial come the end of the season. It could prevent a side winning promotion or avoiding relegation. It prevents young players from perhaps scoring a goal they'd remember forever. If only 5 seconds had been added to August's win against Peterhead we would have been deprived of Luke Rankin's debut goal for the Wasps. which was scored after 90 minutes and 16 seconds of play. For a 17 year old, who the night before had scored a hat-trick for the U20's side, it was quite the moment, with him signing his first professional contract with the club days later. That contract probably wasn't a direct result of the goal, but it shows that players career paths and magic moments can change in a minute!

There is also the paying customer to think about too; football isn't a cheap pursuit and if fans feel short-changed, partly owing to referees playing the correct time, it doesn't bode well. Games at the Recs are regularly slowed down by balls being kicked out of the park or it taking a considerable period of time for balls to be retrieved from the empty segregated Railway End. That, together with regular substitutions, injuries, time-wasting, bookings and goal celebrations means in my mind there should always be at least three added minutes in Alloa home games. The time the ball is in play is therefore considerably lower than at, for example Airdrie. There, a combination of eager ball attendants and an efficient use of the multi-ball system complements the home side's high intensity playing style. The recent World Cup saw games regularly include double-digit times being added, with FIFA framing this in the name of fan enjoyment and value for money of seeing the ball in play for more of the game. I haven't

seen that translate into games Alloa have been involved in yet, with the time added generally being minimised as far as possible, or seemingly almost completely eradicated if one side is in an unassailable lead!

## IRRITATION 2: CLUBS SACKING MANAGERS AFTER 10–15 GAMES

It seems to me that new managers are ever increasingly expected to hit the ground running and achieve good results almost instantly, or otherwise they become under immediate pressure to be replaced soon after being appointed themselves. It really is a sign of the times that clubs are regularly having three different managers a season, as the pressure to succeed is so high that changing the manager becomes almost as commonplace as a controversy about VAR. This season Jack Ross spent 71 days in charge of Dundee United, Stevie Hammell lasted 184 days at Motherwell, while last season Shaun Maloney had a 120 day tenure at Hibernian. Down south Nathan Iones recently lasted 94 days at Southampton, but the revolving door of managers is in full swing within the English Championship with Huddersfield and QPR even eclipsing market leaders Watford this season. In West Yorkshire Danny Schofield lasted 69 days

and Scotsman Mark
Fotheringham managed
another 133 days, before the relegation zone
Terriers persuaded wily
veteran Neil Warnock to
come out of retirement
a fortnight ago. At Loftus
Road Neil Critchley was
sacked last weekend just
12 games into a threeand-a-half year contract,
after succeeding Michael
Beale in mid-December.

When managers are replaced within 10 to 15 games of first being appointed I consider that the majority of the blame should be with the board of directors who made the original decision to hire the coach. No manager can be expected to turn things around immediately, especially when they have more likely than not inherited problems themselves. However, the high stakes and often unrealistic obsession with success (even though only a small proportion of clubs can actually achieve real success each season) means the managerial merry-goround is getting bigger and faster year-on-year. Regular managerial changes point to bigger problems within the structure of a club to me, so directors should take more of the blame than they do in these situations. Managers are ultimately the fall-guys in what becomes akin to a carry-on film. The **English Championship** really is the vanguard

for managerial changes, as owners desperately chase the ultimate goal of the riches of the Premier League, Kolo Toure's 58 day reign at Wigan, Mark Hudson's 117 days at Cardiff and the 87 day spell at 'hotseat' specialists Watford of Rob Edwards are three further examples this season where clubs lurch from one crisis to another. My simple solution would be for there to be manager windows, with managers like players only allowed to be changed during the close season and January. Perhaps that would focus the minds of trigger happy chairmen, who just crash and burn between recurring strategies of

recruiting the bright up and coming manager, or the internal candidate from within the club and then the veteran firefighter appointments season-by-season.

### IRRITATION 3: UNNEC-ESSARY USE OF THE DARK ARTS

The dark arts are commonplace in football, as every player knows the tricks of the trade to gain any advantage they can. For example, when playing to secure a narrow win in the final minutes of games everyone knows about full-backs taking an age to take throw-ons or keepers taking goal-kicks, players feigning injuries to break up play or kicking

the ball out of the ground. I accept such instances as just part of the game we now call football. However, there are some instances of gamesmanship which I think are needless and pointless, with them actually having inadvertent negative consequences. The most commonplace one is endlessly appealing for decisions you know shouldn't go your wav. If I were a referee I would quickly become tired of every single player calling for a throw or corner to go in their teams favour, when 99 times of out 100 the player already knows it is a futile request. Trying to con a ref on mundane decisions is a waste of time and, in my opinion,

only serves to annoy officials, who may then go against you later in the game on the big decisions. Of course officials never consciously do that, but unconsciously I think it certainly can. Players will say they have to appeal for everything, as if they didn't they wouldn't get the 1 out of 100 times the referee buys your appeal. However, my view would be to only appeal when you have to, let the referee govern the game and only make your appeals when they really are disputable calls, in order for them to unconsciously have greater impact with the official.

## CHANGES ARE LICHTSOME

There were still eleven games to play in the 1922/23 Scottish First Division but the football fans of the Wee County were losing faith. Alloa sat rock bottom of the table in their first season in the top flight and while hopes had been raised by the end of January victory over Albion Rovers - Alloa's first win in three months they had quickly been dashed once more with a meek 2-0 defeat at Motherwell. That game

had again exposed Alloa's great weakness with several golden chances passed up. "The same old story" was the conclusion in the local Devon Valley Tribune, with columnist 'Ben Cleuch' concluding a gloomy preview of the forthcoming clash against Partick with a prediction of a poor attendance: "There is one thing sure, and that is that there will not be a very large crowd to see this fixture, as a

great number of Alloa supporters are utterly disgusted by the displays given by their football favourites and have vehemently expressed that they won't, on any consideration, go and see Alloa play again this season. But as the old saying goes: 'Changes are lichtsome!"

But Ben Cleuch hadn't bargained on a change which was sure to be lichtsome indeed to Alloa folk: the return of Willie Crilley to the Wasps attack, Crillev had been welcomed back to the Recs like a homecoming hero in September 1922 – just a few months after his ill-fated switch to Celtic with Alloa fans sure this was the final ingredient required to see the team consolidate in the First Division. This was the man, after all, who had scored more than 50 goals the season before. Alas, the move had not gone to plan. Crilley

had sustained a bad injury on his second Alloa debut, which he had then aggravated while attempting to return too quickly. From there things had deteriorated completely, the 'midget centre' absconding from a Glasgow hospital as he waited for a knee op and subsequently being banned by the Wasps. That suspension had been lifted only when he agreed to relocate to Alloa for treatment. In spite of everything, the Alloa board were reported to be hoping still "that Crilley will ere long return to the team perfectly fit, and give service such as he rendered last season". Time was running out, but as Partick arrived in Alloa on February 10th 1923, Willie Crilley was back on the field.

Questions might have remained about Crilley's conduct, as well his dodgy knee and general match fitness, but his very presence in the team clearly gave Alloa a lift. "The Alloa forwards were in rampant form...they evidenced a liveliness which has only been conspicious by its absence in recent games", reported the Sunday Post. They were only rampant enough to get one goal - Cochrane finishing after a goalkeeping mistake – but that one goal was enough to win the match. Crilley was said to have been

"bright but not outstanding" and had visibly tired late on, but his return had once again given the team and fans belief. "He has been described as Alloa's last hope, and he now has a chance to distinguish himself', concluded the Post. The Devon Valley Tribune went further, declaring that that the hopes of Alloa fans were now "soaring sky high" and that the victory was surely down to the return of the "one time idol Crilley". No pressure, Willie.

It was two wins from three from Alloa now. They were level at the bottom with Albion Rovers with three other teams within four points. With ten games left it was still an

uphill struggle but by no means impossible. Next up was a tough game with Hibs – just a point from 2nd - but who the Wasps had beaten earlier in the campaign. The home team were hit by injury and two call ups for the Scottish League team facing the English League at Newcastle. Alloa started well, the in form Cochrane firing them ahead at Easter Road after 18 minutes. The depleted Hibs had a quick response though, Kerr bringing the Leith men level. In a one sided second-half it was Thomson in the Alloa goal who kept his team in the game, but even hopes of a point were extinguished when Walker forced home a rebound for 2-1 win for Hibs. It was tough on the Alloa

keeper who was said to have been "wonderful" and "miraculous", with the papers noting that Thomson had been in excellent form ever since his short spell out of the team over the festive period. "Had it not been for Thomson the score would have been 22-1 instead of 2-1" said 'Ben Cleuch'. adding that even Alloa's "keenest and most optimistic supporters" now acceped that survival in the top flight was most unlikely.

Alloa were in desperate need of points as they prepared for a busy week of games against St Mirren, Raith Rovers and Celtic. More in the next edition of The Wasp.



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### **A FAN'S VIEW**

The past few weeks have provided a mixed bag for Alloa results wise-with a win, draw and defeat across the three games played. Alloa shook off that heavy Airdrie defeat on the road with a home victorv over Peterhead which was more comfortable than the scoreline suggested. And although they failed to pick up a victory over Falkirk in the recent matches between the clubs, the players can take credit from matching them in every department in matches two and three of the recent trilogy.

The Peterhead game saw a few changes to the starting lineup after the tepid performance against Airdrie the previous week. Mark Durnan

was recalled into the centre of defence for added stability across the backline. Durnan has had reduced playing time this season for a number of reasons. but he's a popular figure amongst supporters and his return was a welcome one. We also got our first proper glimpse of Quinn Coulson in an Alloa jersey. He had made his debut the previous week, but its nigh on impossible to really assess a player when he's introduced at 4-0 down, Alloa started on the front foot in the game, and they didn't really deviate from that for the majority of the 90 minutes. Peterhead have signed several players recently as manager Davie Robertson undertakes

surgery on the squadand they looked fairly disjointed for most of the afternoon. Alloa got their noses in front early on with seventeen minutes played. Conor Sammon took advantage of pretty shambolic Peterhead defending to guide the ball into the net. Footage of the goalor the farcical build updid get some comedic traction on social media but as disastrous as the defending was, Sammons finish was pretty well taken- not quite "like Ursula Andress emerging from the sea in Dr No" as I described it on Twitter- but a tidy finish none the less. Alloa missed a hatful of chances to add some comfort to their lead. but the outcome was never in any real doubt.

The three points was the most important factor to get back on the saddle after Airdrie. I was pretty impressed with Coulson all afternoon. His signing was very much under the radar, but he has injected some energy and drive into the teamdeservedly keeping his place in the starting eleven for both Falkirk games. I liked his confidence too- any player who takes the ball for key set pieces on his starting debut certainly has a degree of belief in his own ability. And both his free kick efforts came close to extending Alloa's lead.

It was a quick return on the Tuesday night for the rearranged league match with Falkirk. Alloa

received a pre match boost with the loan signing of Michael Dovle from Hamilton Accies for his third spell at the club. Doyley is a hugely popular figure amongst the support and will be a great character in the dressing room. More importantly though, he brings a wealth of experience into the squad. You forget where Doyley has been since his previous departure from the club- St Johnstone, Queen of the South, Morton, Falkirk, Queens Park and Hamilton Accies. A pretty decent club career, with a pedigree that can only add to what we currently have. Our near neighbours Falkirk came into this game off the back of a real purple patch with six successive victories. They attracted a sizeable travelling support under the floodlights and it had the making of an enjoyable night. Alloa again started brightly against their opponents, just as they had in the January Scottish Cup tie. They forced a save from Falkirk keeper P.J. Morrison after barely a minute on the clock and had further early chances through a Sammon header and a blocked MacIver effort. Stefan Scougall came closest, with his excellent long-range strike smashing the upright with Morrison stranded. There were fewer chances on goal in the second half though,

and Falkirk began to get some traction after introducing Gary Oliver and Callum Morrison from the bench, Alloa were injury depleted by comparison and relied on youngsters- Rayan Mohammed and Luke Rankin. Both can be proud. With little over ten minutes to go opportunities on goal from MacIver and sub Adam King were diverted in the space of 30 secondsand you got the feeling it wasn't going to be Alloas night in front of goal. Worse was to come though with 4 minutes remaining. Falkirk were awarded a soft free kick. where there appeared little contact from Scot Taggart on Morrison. From the resultant set piece, Gary Oliver struck home at the far post to give the visitors the lead. Alloa desperately searched for an equaliser and were rewarded with a penalty kick deep into stoppage time. It was great work by Mohammed to pressure Coll Donaldson, who panicked as he tried to get goal side. The ball struck his arm and the referee pointed to the spot. Despite his valium-inducing previous penalty strike against Clyde in December, Scott Taggart is Mr Reliable from the spot and was never missing this one. He struck home to give Alloa a share of the points, which was the least they deserved. The conclusion certainly contributed, but I thoroughly enjoyed the night- a terrific atmosphere on the terraces and a decent spectacle on the pitch.

After a free Saturday due to the Scottish Cup. Alloa resumed their battles with Falkirk-this time crossing the Forth as the visitors. Falkirk were buoyed by their comfortable Scottish Cup win at Darve. Their exuberance at the victory was more attributed to the understandably lop sided pre match media coverage which covered Aberdeens conquerors in its near entirety. The win was to be expected, despite the Aberdeen heroics- had Alloa defeated Falkirk in the cup Id have also been confident of us beating Darvel. Despite a decent home crowd and a good travelling support, in terms of a spectacle this game didn't get close to the previous midweek at Alloa. There was little between the teams again- not a great deal of chances on goal but split fairly evenly. Callum Morrison made the difference with a strike on half time- his performance made the decision to omit him from the starting eleven in the previous game baffling. Alloa had a good opening half hour, with second half opportunities on goal to level the game but just couldn't get that break in front of goal. Whilst its far from the best Falkirk team I've witnessed in my time

watching Alloa, they had to improve at some point. John McGlynn has inevitably made the team better but these past three matches have shown there is very little between Alloa and Falkirk, and Alloa should approach the next set of fixtures with belief. The team have looked a lot stronger at the back in these past three games. At the other end of the pitch though, Alloa haven't been as clinical in front of goal- not just applicable to the strikers but all across the team. With Brad Rodden still injured, Kevin Cawley is an option we could utilise up top if available. Admittedly almost a decade ago, but I think back to the partnership Kevin formed with Callum Elliot at a similar stage of the seasonwhere he worked well off a striker who is more of a physical presence. Coulson and Dovle are really good additions, and hopefully Luke Donnelly can get some more minutes today as he looks to get back on a good run in the team. Montrose are one of our direct rivals in promotion play-off race, so todays match could be a fairly decisive one. The previous 2 matches between the clubs were both fairly cagey affairs, which is quite unlike this fixture. Alloa have a good modern record against their opponents today, and hopefully that continues with three points.

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





### THE BOSS -STEWART PETRIE

It only took him two

Petrie, who is so tipped to move on to higher divisions, will look to try close the gap this season and take his Montrose side into the second tier.

### THE CAPTAIN PAUL WATSON

Montrose continue to be led by Paul Watson on the pitch. The midfielder is on for his testimonial at the Mo' after joining back in 2012 from St Andrews United, which was actually his third spell spell at the club. What began as a loan spell from Forfar and Arbroath has turned into Winker', as he is dubbed, become

a local legend up North. Known for his spectacular free-kicks, he took his place in Montrose history by leading them to their first league title in thirty-three years. His contributions recently have been limited as since returning to the squad, has only been able to make appearances off the bench. Watson has played just 19 minutes of league football this year in his 5 appearances.

Petrie made interesting moves in the January window with the pre-contract signing of Ryan Williamson, however, one who can look to make an immediate impact is the arrival of Matheus Machado. The midfielder was born in Sao Paulo, Brazil, and after a firm footing in the game in his home nation

moved to Scotland in 2018 with Inverness Caledonian Thistle. Following a spell up North, he made the move into Europe to play for Portugal's Primera Ligaside, Rio Ave, before returning to Scotland with Elgin City. It was a move to Rothes in the Highland League that

caught the eye of many, including Montrose. After 5 goals and 7 assists for Rothes, Petrie swooped in to secure Machado on an 18-month deal. He made his debut for the club last Saturday coming off the bench in the draw against FC Edinburgh.

### ONE TO WATCH-RORY MCALLISTER

Until the day he retires, Rory McAllister is always going to be the threat to watch out for i you are an opposing team. The 35-year old striker has been scoring goals for fun most of this century for a variety of clubs, most notably Peterhead, Cove, and now Montrose. In 2018, he became the first player to reach 100 goals since the SPFL began and
