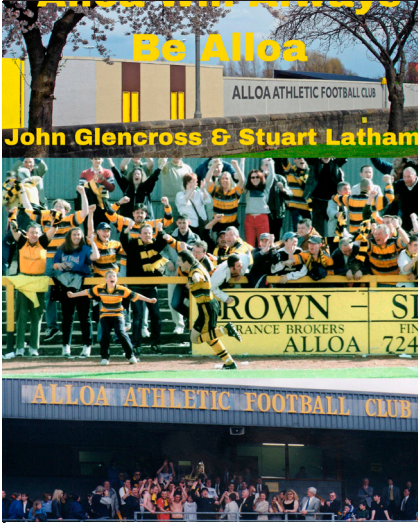

ALLOA'S PERFECT FEBRUARY

Seldom in football does everything go right for your club, so when it does it needs to be recognised and celebrated. The Wasps enjoyed a perfect February, with five successive league victories catapulting the club from 6th in the table at the beginning of the month up to 3rd by the end of February.

The month began with an away victory at Annan, which in reality was more comfortable than the final 3-2 scoreline suggested, with the Wasps good value for the three points on the day. That was followed up by three home wins in a week, with Stirling deservedly defeated by a stunning Taylor Steven strike, Annan were seen off again thanks to a late Conor Sammon winner in a match which could have gone either way in the

second half, and the Wasps then clinically dispatched Cove Rangers 4-1 in a game which was far closer than the scoreline suggested. The month finished with Alloa eking out very last drop of effort and capitalising on some Hamilton fragility to make it a maximum fifteen points from five matches.

To put that excellent sequence of victories into context, it was the first time since 2012 that Alloa had won five league games on the bounce. That came when the Wasps were on the march towards the Third Division title under rookie manager Paul Hartley, when seven successive victories from the end of February (beginning with Darren Young's first goal for the club in a narrow 1-0 win over Clyde) and culminating in the

championship being secured (with four games to spare) in the early April 8-1 demolition of Elgin at the Recs. The Wasps have of course won five successive games more recently when cup competitions are also factored into the equation. This most recently occurred between October and November 2017, as Jim Goodwin's Wasps got back on track after an indifferent first quarter, acting as a springboard for eventual promotion that season. It would also be remiss not to mention the glorious club record (SFL era) ten successive victories which began the 2016/17 season under Jack Ross, when Alloa turned into prime Barcelona for two months, although six of those wins were in cup games.

You have to go back even

further in time since Alloa won five consecutive league games at the third tier level of the game. That last occurred almost twenty years ago, back in the 2004/05 season under Tom Hendrie, as part of a seven game winning streak in all competitions. That run included the pre-Christmas comeback win versus Arbroath (recovering from being 2-0 down in the 67th minute to win 4-2 thanks to goals from Chris Townsley, a double from defensive partner Michael Bolochoweckyj and one from all-action midfielder Brown Ferguson), a new year 3-2 win at Brechin (which I vividly remember following from afar whilst travelling back on the train from Ipswich to university in Cardiff – when arriving at Liverpool Street the Wasps were losing 2-1, but after emerging from the depths of the underground at Paddington, Alloa had won 3-2 thanks to a Ross Hamilton equaliser and a late Michael Bolochoweckyj winner – euphoria!) and then smashing Ayr 5-1 and Dumbarton 4-2 (having been 4-0 up after 24 minutes) on successive January afternoons at the Recs. Hendrie's run of wins at the beginning of 2005 actually mirrored a run of five successive wins at the beginning of 2004 too, as the Wasps bounced back from the humiliation of a 5-3 cup reverse at Spartans to ease relegation fears in the league. That run included four weeks of victories with clean sheets (3-0 v Dumbarton, featuring Michael Daly's debut goal and madcap shirt swinging celebrations, 1-0 at East Fife and 4-0 home successes against Forfar and Arbroath).

Returning to the present day, there have been some pleasing features of Alloa's latest winning run. Two of Alloa's loan signings



have undoubtedly been drawing plaudits for their goalscoring form. Taylor Steven's four goals and two assists saw him add numbers to the promise he showed during the first half of the season. The fact two of those strikes were match-winners, together with the sheer aesthetic quality of delightfully curling home two goals from outside the box into the far corner of the net, meant Steven was very much the man of the moment in February. For me,

Steven's all-round play has been sensational too, with his confidence evidently sky high, showcasing pace, trickery and a variety of dribbling styles cutting inside and out to make him a key weapon in Alloa's dynamic front-line. His off-the-ball play has also been sharpened too, with his commitment to the cause particularly evident in winning back possession and starting moments of transition. By the time you read this the divisional player of the month will be likely to have been announced and I would be surprised if Taylor isn't the recipient in light of his recent heroics.

In any normal month Bobby Wales's 4 goals in 5 games would be drawing the spotlight towards the Kilmarnock loanee too, with his return to the Wasps at the end of the January transfer window being a potentially pivotal moment in Alloa's prospects this season. An early double at Annan and coming close to making it a hat-trick got him back amongst the goals, which he followed up with a simple strike in the return fixture versus Annan and then coolly finished a 1v1 chance versus Cove too to make it 4 goals in 4 games, or 7 in his last 8 if you prefer. But Bobby is much more than just a goalscorer, with his all round game already looking highly promising for an 18 year old, full of delightful first touches to turn defenders and get the Wasps on the front foot, his considerable skill in tight spaces, keen running and a variety of finishes being a joy to behold for Alloa fans. Whisper it quietly, but Alloa have been spoilt with the calibre of loan strikers in the past decade or so, with Wales having all the attributes to hopefully emulate some of his predecessors.

Credit is also due in no small part to manager Andy Graham,



who has had the faith to trust a largely youthful front-line, with Ethan Sutherland (17) joining Wales (18) and Steven (19), as well as Steven Buchanan and Quinn Coulson too (both 20). Andy's only in the infancy of his managerial career, but the early signs are highly promising, with his Alloa side having some of the hallmarks Andy demonstrated with such distinction as a player, with a will to win like no other, but doing things with a bit of style too. It's clear for all to see that he has his squad fully focused and buying into his methods.

Nowhere is this better seen in goals being scored by substitutes. During February, the match-winning strikes by both Conor Sammon and Jon Robertson came after they were introduced from the bench, with that taking the total goals scored by subs this season up to eight. For me, that reflects well on the culture in the squad, with everyone fully committed to the team, ready to play whenever they are required and really demonstrates that the

subs are engaged in the process, understand their roles in the system and make telling impacts at important stages of games when they enter the fray. The fact that this happened last season too (twelve goals from subs) means it has happened for a good period of time and reflects well on the ethos of the club as a whole. The end of February saw Graham complete his first 12 league games as Alloa manager, which is the same number of games as Brian Rice took charge of before departing for Livingston this season. Rice picked up fourteen points in that dozen games, whereas Andy amassed twenty-four, thereby averaging two points a game, which is an excellent return. That included a win-rate of 58%, or 83% if you measure it by the Derek Adams metric of win&draws rate!

Of course last weekend that winning run came to an end at Montrose, but Andy spoke well after the match (as he consistently has so far) about how impressed he was with the players' performance having been reduced to ten men with

a third of the game to play. It is often said that you learn more about your players in times of adversity or defeat. I was hugely encouraged by the way the Wasps continued to take the game to Montrose despite the numerical disadvantage and the almost swashbuckling style Alloa attacked with would have pleased Graham no doubt. That defeat occurred in March, so hopefully by the time you read this Andy may have picked up the divisional manager of the month award? His only competitor from my viewpoint was John McGlynn, who also enjoyed a 100% win rate, but given Falkirk's month comprised three league games to Alloa's five, surely Andy did enough to get the nod?!

A final reflection on Alloa's February is given to the unlikely goalscorers in the satisfying victory at Hamilton. Kurtis Roberts' first goal for the Wasps was long overdue, but it was worth the wait with his exquisite slaloming away from the Accies midfield before firing home from distance a moment of pure joy. Roberts himself clearly enjoyed it, although his competition with Taylor Steven for quirkiest goal celebration was not something I was hoping or expecting to be discussing! Those scenes were then eclipsed with Jon Robertson's late winner, marking his first goal for almost seven years (2,479 days to be precise!), in which time Robbo had gone an incredible 214 appearances without finding the net. After nine months out and in just his third appearance of the season, it was delightful to see Jon contribute to Alloa's victory in the best possible way.

Hopefully in the coming months there are a few more winning streaks just like the Wasps experienced in February.

REFEREE RAGE AND HEADRICK'S BAD DAY

"ALLOA INVADED" was the headline in the Evening News as derby day approached in the Wee County. 1923/24 had been a season to forget for the Wasps as dreams of an immediate return to the top flight were dashed by a desperately poor start to the season. A fine run in November had brought renewed hope only for Alloa to fall back into their inconsistent ways. There had been a tonic in early February when the Wasps held Hibs 1-1 in

Leith in the Scottish Cup, only to be thumped 5-0 back at the Recs in the replay. Alloa seemed to suffer an extended hangover after that defeat, subsequently drawing 0-0 with Bo'ness before losing 5-0 at Dumbarton and 2-0 at Forfar. By the time King's Park of Stirling arrived at the Recs on March 1st 1924, the Wasps were without a win in five and without a goal in four. Alloa fans could only hope that the visit of their old rivals from Stirling would

once more inspire the team to raise their game. While King's Park were having a much better season and were still in with an outside chance of grabbing the second promotion place, the two previous games between the sides had been close, Alloa winning 2-1 at the Recs in the Stirlingshire Cup and King's Park squeezing home 1-0 at Forthbank in the league. "King's Park proceed to Alloa. It should be a strenuous contest, with

excitement ruling outside and inside the ropes, as the rivalry between the two clubs is of long standing", continued the Evening News. Up to 2000 visiting fans were expected with special trains and buses laid on, and with King's Park now four points off second, albeit with a game in hand, the Stirling men really needed to win. For Alloa the chance to deal a blow to the hopes of King's Park was all the motivation required. "The towns are only six miles apart and for nearly half a century there has been much rivalry between them in sport, and particularly football", noted the Dundee Courier in their preview. "This season the Stirling club has much the better league record, but that will have no effect on tomorrow's result, as when these teams meet anything might happen". Or so Alloa hoped at least.

A crowd of over 4,000 was present when the sides took to the field but after the big build up they saw something of a damp squib. There was an early blow for Alloa when Morris was knocked out and carried from the field. During his absence the Stirling men took control and Lamond turned the ball into the net "after a series of miskicks in the Alloa defence". Morris returned – perhaps after a dose of smelling salts – and took up position at outside left despite being "incapacitated". King's Park failed

to find the decisive second goal however, leaving the door open for Alloa. Veteran winger Jock Stirling carved open the visitors and sent in "a beauty of a cross" only for the Alloa strikers to miss an open goal. There was still one more chance to come and the hero in black and gold was Jock Coutts, a former Wasp who had just been brought back to the club and who had moved into centre-half after the injury to Morris. Coutts belted in a free kick from 30 yards that evaded the visiting keeper and saved an unlikely point for Alloa. The papers felt the King's Park goalie should have saved the effort from Coutts and that the game itself hadn't fulfilled expectations. For Alloa it stopped the rot, repelled the invasion from Stirling and denied the promotion chasing neighbours a crucial point in the process; that wasn't a bad day's work.

Next up was another local game as the Wasps prepared to make the journey to West Fife to take on Cowdenbeath. The Miners were sitting in second but a surprise defeat against Forfar while Alloa were holding King's Park had seen their cushion over the Stirling men and Stenhousemuir cut to three points, with Bathgate and Albion Rovers just behind. In short, Cowden needed to win. Morris was fit to resume at centre-half with Coutts and Gilmour beside him and Quinn re-appearing in attack. It was the Alloa defence of Somerville and the returning

McGregor who were busiest though as Cowdenbeath went in search of the points. Crawford made two saves at point blank range as Alloa tried to hold on but disaster struck before the break when an unnamed Wasps defender miskicked a clearance into his own net. Alloa improved in the second-half with Ross and Connaboy impressing on the flanks but they drew a blank in front of goal with the game ending 1-0 for Cowden.

There was better news for another Wasp for Arthur McNally was finally back in action. The midfielder had rejected a new deal at the end of the First Division campaign but had subsequently become embroiled in a dispute over a proposed transfer to either Hamilton or Clyde. The SFA had stepped in to ban McNally – surely a draconian measure – with the player stuck in limbo and Alloa left in possession of cheques from Accies and the Bully Wee that they couldn't cash. A deal had now been struck to allow McNally to go on loan to Clyde with Alloa to receive £200 if the transfer was made permanent in the summer. It wasn't the ideal solution but at least McNally was back on the field.

Next up for the Wasps was another derby with Stenhousemuir set to visit the Recs. By the time that game came around however, attention had very much switched away from football. More in the next edition of The Wasp.

A FAN'S VIEW

Last month we rounded off February with a home game against Cove Rangers and a trip to Hamilton.

Cove Rangers have been the only team that Alloa have managed maximum points against this season and despite tired legs after the midweek win against Annan the Wasps would again come out on top against the Aberdeenshire side.

The visitors started the better of the two teams with Alloa absorbing pressure from Paul Hartley's men but as the half progressed Alloa came more into it culminating in a penalty award before half time. Taylor Steven producing a strong run into the box and Mark Reynolds responding by scything him to ground before he could get a

shot away. Captain Scott Taggart made no mistake and Alloa went in at the break ahead.

Bobby Wales would compound Cove's misery with Gillingham's heavy touch pounced on for the on-loan striker to run through and slot past Balint Demus.

Cove would make an impact through substitute Kyle Connell's headed goal after a pinpoint cross from Blair Yule but Alloa almost immediately hit back with Taylor Steven cutting in from the right and producing almost a carbon copy of his goal vs Stirling to curl home into the far corner and restore Alloa's two goal lead.

The St Johnstone winger would pop up again late with

a drive home to set up Alloa's biggest win of the season and not even David McKay's harsh straight red could take the polish off a fine win over their playoff rivals.

Next up was a trip to Hamilton who were under renewed pressure after losing out to Falkirk. The first half was a gargantuan length with some lengthy stoppages due to a really nasty head knock between Kieran MacDonald and Miko Virtanen and then later between Virtanen and his own goalkeeper PJ Morrison. Neither midfielder survived the half in what is to my memory the first concussion subs I've seen used in an Alloa game. Hamilton were effectively the better team in that stop start period but the real action would kick off in the second half.

In what is undoubtedly a standout contender for goal of the season, Kurtis Roberts would skin two Hamilton players and strike a rocket from at least 35 yards. His first goal for Alloa is a truly memorable one which also drew a interesting celebration with Kurtis doing his best bird impression.

The Wasps were almost brought back to earth immediately though as another former striker, Euan Henderson popped up unmarked in the box to head expertly past Morrison and the game was finely balanced up until a late spark from the teams veterans.

Conor Sammon flicked over a corner delivery on the edge

of the six yard box and lying unmarked at the back post - Jon Robertson would manage a rare goal! On closer viewing the midfielder had almost missed it with needing the post to help it on it's way in and there was no pre-canned celebration for his first goal since 2017-18. Jon had looked like he couldn't believe he'd put the ball in the back of the net but it was euphoric again for the Wasps who made it a perfect February.

Unfortunately every good run has to come to an end at some point and Montrose would be the team to finally inflict that loss on Alloa.

It went wrong from the beginning with some iffy defending letting Blair Lyons waltz through 1v1 with PJ Morrison and nutmeg the goalkeeper on his way to the Montrose opener. After the slow start however Alloa would produce some of the finest attacking football that we've shown this season. Near constantly creating openings as the midfield buzzed about unopposed and it would take desperation on the line from Montrose and a bit of fortune from the woodwork to deny Alloa an equaliser but that luck would soon run out as Taggart drew a save from Gill and Taylor Steven rattled home the rebound low into the corner of the net.

Ethan Sutherland who had missed an open goal earlier then fancied his chances after shrugging off the Montrose defence and firing a driven effort into the bottom right corner to get his first professional goal. It was no less than Alloa deserved in a scintillating half but again they could bemoan their defending with a late set piece.

Sean Dillon was left unmarked as the delivery found him around the penalty spot and he found a solid contact and an unstoppable header to beat Morrison and level the score before half time.

The second half was another lackadaisical start from Alloa but they could have been helped with the referee missing an obvious foul on Bobby Wales in the buildup to Montrose third goal. As it was play continued to Alloa's incredulity and Kane Hester found his way through the Alloa defence to slot the ball into the bottom corner.

To make matters worse Alloa were reduced to 10 men with Kevin Cawley mouthing off to referee Duncan Williams after yet another decision went against the Wasps. The Alloa talisman was brandished the straight red and the job of continuing the winning run became that much harder.

Despite the numbers disadvantage the game quickly descended into what can only be described as a basketball game with both sides crafting one attack after another. Alloa would eventually win a corner that Sutherland would float into the front post and with unreal technique, Bobby Wales

backheel volleyed it beyond Gill in the Montrose goal for an equaliser!

Somehow things almost got even better with Sammon denied only by the bar and Alloa being denied by more last ditch Montrose defending.

Unfortunately at the other end the set pieces would again be a thorn in Alloa's side with Devine giving away a foul from a desperate slide. Gardyne stepped up and floated it to Graham Webster to bundle home what would be the winner.

Alloa would pressure with another two especially dangers crosses but not until goalkeeper PJ Morrison joined the attack did Alloa craft an end product. PJ's first effort cleared off the line and the second stopped with a wall of bodies in the six yard box. PJ's first header was cleared off the line and a second was blocked inside the six yard box. Despite the scoreline - a truly entertaining game and there was a palpable feeling of what if Alloa had eleven on the field. Still plenty to look forward to with attacking displays like that and hopefully a few lessons to be learned defensively.

LOOKING BACK 6TH MARCH 1993

In the quarter-finals of The Scottish Cup, holders Rangers progressed to the semi-finals, after a 3-0 win at the last surviving Second Division club, Arbroath. The Edinburgh duo of Hearts & Hibs also reached the semi-final stage, after both achieved 2-0 home wins, v Falkirk and St. Johnstone respectively, while Aberdeen and Clydebank faced a replay, after a 1-1 draw at Pittodrie.

The top of The Premier Division was unchanged, with leaders Rangers nine points clear of second-placed Aberdeen, then came Celtic, who were also gameless, Hearts and Dundee United, & the latter were victori-

ous by 3-1 at relegation-haunted Airdrie. This result saw The Diamonds slip into bottom place, on goal difference from Falkirk, while Motherwell collected a useful point from a 1-1 draw at Dundee, which moved them up one place, & The Well were replaced in third-bottom spot by gameless Partick.

First Division leaders Raith continued their relentless march towards a first-ever spell in The Premier Division, with a 2-0 home win v Morton, while Rovers second-placed local rivals Dunfermline kept up their own promotion bid, after a 1-0 win v another of the challengers, fourth-placed St. Mirren, at Love

Street. Kilmarnock remained third, in spite of a 0-2 reverse at relegation-haunted Stirling Albion, while Hamilton Accies, despite being held 1-1 at home by Dumbarton, still retained fifth spot. Luckless bottom club Cowdenbeath's fate now seemed virtually sealed after a 1-3 defeat at Ayr, and while Stirling Albion remained in second-bottom place in spite of their welcome win, they were now only a point worse off than third-bottom Meadowbank, who were game less.

Brechin retained leadership of The Second Division, thanks to a 2-1 win at lowly Queen Of The South, second-placed Clyde

were 1-0 winners at Berwick, while third-placed Stranraer overcame another of the strugglers, Queen's Park, by 4-2 at Stair Park. Alloa & East Fife, two of the other challengers, met in an important clash at Bayview, the game ending all-square at 2-2, William Brown and David Beaton (pen) netting for The Fifers, David Beaton had been with East Fife from 1990-1998, later to join Alloa in 1998 – 2000 and was part of "The Wasps" side which won the Challenge Cup after defeating Inverness CT. Barrie Moffat with a brace was on target for The Wasps, who'd lined up as follows: Jim Butter, Willie Newbigging, Neil Bennett, Davie Wilcox, Keith McCulloch, Lawrence Crombie,

Barrie Moffat, John McNiven, Shaun Smith, Michael Hendry (John Gibson), Neil McAvoy. Alloa thus remained in fourth spot, with East Fife still two places below, fifth-placed Forfar were 1-0 home victors v Stenhousemuir, while Albion Rovers, despite collecting a point from a 1-1 draw at fellow strugglers Montrose, still propped up the table.

Down in England, it was also Cup quarter-final day. And fancied Arsenal reached the semi-finals after a 4-2 win at Ipswich, the Blackburn v Sheffield United tie ended in a goalless stalemate, while the Manchester City v Spurs & Derby v Sheffield Wednesday ties took place the following Sunday and Monday respectively.

In The Premier League, Manchester United regained top spot in place of gameless Aston Villa, thanks to a 2-1 win at Liverpool, while third-placed Norwich's hopes of taking the first-ever Premier League title suffered a blow, after a 1-3 defeat at QPR, who thus moved up to fourth place. In the only other topflight game, lowly Wimbledon's relegation fears continued in the shape of a 1-2 home defeat v Southampton.

First Division leaders Newcastle maintained their seven-point advantage, after they hammered Brentford 5-1 at St. James Park, second-placed West Ham were also victorious on home soil, by 3-1 v Wolves, while Swindon, 4-0 winners at Watford, were now third.

This afternoon we return to the Indodrill stadium after 2 successive away matches to face Kelty Hearts. The visitors currently sit in 6th position, 10 points behind the Wasps who dropped down to 4th after the defeat at Montrose. Kelty are coming off the back of a heavy defeat to Hamilton Accies, who swept them aside 5-0. Prior to that they had hard fixtures against league leaders Falkirk and high-flying Montrose, which they also lost out on. The visitors last victory came against Edinburgh City

in mid-February, when a late Ross Cunningham strike was the difference in a 3-2 victory. Michael Tidser will be looking to return to winning ways this afternoon but faces another stern test as they complete their quartet of matches against the sides currently occupying the play-off positions.

THE BOSS – MICHAEL TIDSER

There was plenty of change both on and off the park in the summer for Kelty. At the helm, with the departure of

John Potter to Raith Rovers, Kelty looked to within for the next manager and appointed experienced midfielder, Michael Tidser, as player manager. A formula that has worked in this division, with Airdrie finding success in a similar manner under Rhys McCabe. The 34-year-old central midfielder had a successful playing career for the likes of Greenock Morton, Rotherham, and Falkirk, before joining Kelty in 2020. During his time at New Central Park, he has been an influential member of a team that has secured



multiple promotions to go from Lowland League to League 1 in a few years. His team have played impressive football this season with a style that is easy on the eye and Tidser is still a key part of that. The boss has played 20 games in the league this season, with 2 goals and an assist to his name.

THE CAPTAIN – REECE LYON

Kelty will be led out by another central midfielder as Reece Lyon resumes captain duties for the visitors. Subject to plenty of January transfer speculation, Lyon has been impressive in the middle of the park for Kelty this season. His integral role in the team is showcased in the fact that he hasn't missed, or been subbed off, a single minute of their league campaign. That equates to 26 appearances, where he has bagged 4 goals and 2 assists in the process. Within those goals, he did find the back of the net in Alloa's 3-1 win over Kelty in October. At the age of 23, Lyon has plenty



of potential but also has bags of experience with 88 appearances for Greenock Morton and an influential season at Annan Athletic before joining Kelty last summer.

ONE TO WATCH – ALFIE BAVIDGE

Leading the goalscoring statistics for the visitors is young striker, Alfie Bavidge. Highly rated in this country, Bavidge is on loan

from Aberdeen to Kelty for his first real experience of first-team football. It has been an experience that has proved fruitful for both parties though as Bavidge catches the eye with his goals and overall play. In his 17 appearances, he sits on 7 goals, as well as bagging a couple of assists too. In a move similar to Alloa's with Bobby Wales, both strikers battle in League 1, but then join forces for Billy Stark's u19 Scotland side. Bavidge has 9 caps at u19 level, scoring 1 goal against Czech Republic.

THE CONNECTION

There is one returning player to the Indodrill today for the visitors in Stefan McCluskey. The forward signed for Alloa in 2017 and made his debut against Dunfermline in the Scottish Cup, where he would score his first goal for the club in a 3-2 defeat. At the end of his contract, McCluskey left the club to sign for

non-league side, Pollok. Furthermore, Kelty assistant manager, Kevin McDonald, played for the Wasps in the 2010/11 season. There are currently no former Alloa players playing for Kelty, however, in recent years the clubs have been most connected through the management with Alloa appointing Barry Ferguson from Kelty Hearts in 2021. Ross Philp who was famously the only player remaining at the club when Paul Hartley joined in 2012, departed Kelty after 10 illustrious, going

from Juniors Super League to SPFL League One.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

This will be the 3rd match-up between the sides this season, with both clubs taking a victory each. The opening game between the sides was played out in August where a Ross Cunningham double put the home side in a commanding position. A 91st Cammy O'Donnell free-kick added a late consolation, as well as goal of the season contender.

The return fixture in October was much more favourable for the Wasps. They fell behind early to a Reece Lyon goal, before goals from Brad Rodden, Scott Taggart from the spot, and Taylor Steven's first goal for the club made sure the 3-points were staying in Alloa.

THE MATCHDAY PROGRAMME

“Match programmes – get your match programmes here!” It has been an integral part of the match-day experience for supporters.

A pie, a pint and programme had always been traditional fare for any fan attending a football match, but some clubs have ditched the match programme altogether. Rising print costs and a lack of demand at some clubs has seen an end to this football must. The matchday programme is one of football's great traditions.

A lack of demand has been cited as one of the main reasons why some teams have pulled the plug on this important tradition according to club sources, alongside the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, despite programmes no longer being as profitable, most teams still view

them as a key part of the match-day experience, there are no half-time scoreboards in football grounds now.

Fans are being urged to keep buying programmes - otherwise the sight of sellers outside the grounds or inside will become a thing of the past. Who needs a programme when most teams hand out printed team sheets with the actual team lines, sometimes even quicker the teams are announced on social media before the manager has even got to the dressing room to tell the players his line-up.

A timely feature in a recent issue of *Nutmeg*, the Scottish football periodical, focuses on these pieces of art, described by Greg Gordon, author of the piece, as an “ongoing monologue with the club's fans”. These fortnightly musings remain an incredible resource for historians and students of

the game.

Curtis Sport, are now the UK's leading sports programme publisher, and therefore many of clubs are much the same style and have no individually to them, a programme doesn't need to be big and glossy but have relevant and interesting articles from people within the club who are almost certain to have a better handle on what's going on at their club, rather than some high flying journalist, who normally has to ask someone at the club “What's happening this week” It's vital collectors still can buy a match programme or at worst be able to buy a printed programme direct from the issuing club.

Worse is the fact that match programmes are available online at some clubs to read and download prior to a matchday, surely this is an own goal, and this facility should only be available after the match has been played?

Jim Thomson once sold Stirling Albion programmes outside Annfield Park, the old home of “The Beans” and now contributes to the same publication, sales of which were given a boost by the club's League Two title triumph last season. Now 50, he runs Scottish football programme fairs all over the country having re-engaged with his old interest. “I was lost to the hobby for years,” Thomson says. “I always collected when I was younger. “During lockdown I fell back into it. I was clearing out my loft and I found all my old programmes, and wondered if it was still a thing. Much to my surprise, as much as social

media had killed a lot of it, it was also helping keeping it alive. On Facebook there's pages devoted to Scottish football programmes, mostly buying and selling." But fresh input is needed. "Clubs need to be innovative if they want a younger generation to buy the programme," stresses Thomson. He mentions the routinely excellent Aberdeen programme, among the biggest sellers in Scotland, for imaginative ideas, such as giving stickers away with each issue.

Something else programme editors are careful about is abuse. It's not a fanzine. All contributors to a match programme must make the commitment to the club that they are not going to be abusive about the club – or our opponents for that matter. Every club's match day programme gets sent to the Scottish League, where they scrutinise each issue and will contact clubs if they believe something in print is in bad taste or derogatory and the club's get their knuckles knocked.

Stuart Curtis, the owner of Curtis Sport, is not a fan of digital programmes, though he will work with clubs who decide

to go down that route. "What was the last digital programme you bought or read?" he asks. "Not many people will say, 'Well actually, I have a library of about 12,000 of them'."

His company produces programmes for over 40 teams north and south of the Border. He implores clubs to put the effort into maintaining them – and stresses that it really isn't hard to make them economically viable. "Even if you don't use Curtis Sport, that's fine," he says. "But please, have a programme, whether 40 buy them or 40,000. It's important to keep it going."

Curtis is putting his money where his mouth is. His company is now sponsoring the Scottish Programme and Memorabilia Fair, with the next event taking place on Sunday 2nd June 2024 at the McAlpine Pavilion within Lesser Hampden in Glasgow, from 10.30am – 2.00pm.

This Season 2023-24 in the Scottish Football League clubs who now do not issue a match day programme – Hibernian (Although there is a fans issue), Ross County, Kilmarnock (Monthly Magazine), Airdrie, Inverness CT, Queens Park (Only

Digital), Hamilton Accies, Kelty Hearts. Annan Athletic, Forfar Athletic, Stranraer, Peterhead (Only Digital) which is worrying, the list grows every season.

Also, we have 15 clubs in the Scottish Football League all now using the one printer – Curtis Sports. Aberdeen, Celtic, Dundee, Hearts, Livingston, Motherwell, St. Mirren, Dundee United (Only by Mail order), Dunfermline Athletic, Partick Thistle, Falkirk, Clyde, Dumbar-ton, Elgin City and The Spartans.

I took over the editor's job producing the Alloa Athletic FC Matchday Programme "The Wasp" in Season 1989-90, some 35 years ago now and still find it a honour and privilege to still be allowed to edit the Match Magazine which has through time increased from eight pages to now thirty six pages, but this couldn't be possible without the help of Jonathan Markwell, Donald Pollock, Brian Roach, Andrew Cockburn, Kieren Mooney and Lewis Russell in the Media department to produce a programme the club can be proud of, it would be remiss of me not to mention my brother David who travels all over the country to make sure we have action shots from every match the club plays either the Men's First team or the Women's team which he also gives an unbelievable support.

"Match programmes – get your match programmes here!" It has been an integral part of the match-day experience for supporters over the years, please keep buying and supporting the "The Wasp" and make sure we have a match programme to take home and cherish for all these special memories, when we can say "I was there".
