

AFTER DEFEAT AT KELTY

We never really got going, but I think you have to credit Kelty. They are in a really tough position at the moment. Fair play to them; in the first half, I thought they were way better than us. It wasn't good enough, and to be honest, we were lucky to go in at 0-0. In the second half, we were better, and there wasn't much in the game. We came out and scored the goal, and had a good reaction - as I said, I thought it was a much more even game... and then we go and lose two poor goals from our point of view defensively. But again, I can credit Kelty because they've

shown a good mentality after missing all those chances, after going behind - they've come back and won the game.

It's for me to go away and look at it and think about what we can do for Saturday. I will reflect on this as a whole and not take it in isolation. The players have been outstanding in the last eight to ten games, so we're not in there absolutely berating people, but it's down to the players to respond, and they've done that every time. It's up to us to do that on Saturday, keep the positivity, train well on Thursday, and look forward.

I feel like away from home against Queen of the South, we've probably had a better record, but listen, past records don't wash with me. It's more important that we turn up on Saturday and do exactly what we've done every time we've lost a game of football: respond in the right manner. Hopefully, on Saturday, we pass the ball a bit better. I didn't think we did that enough tonight. We were too one-dimensional, and I don't feel we competed well enough. It's up to us to work on that on Thursday and improve on Saturday.

LOAN GOALS

Every team in the lower leagues relies on loan signings to add a sprinkling of stardust to their squads. In the past decade or so. Alloa have been fortunate to have borrowed and showcased the talents of some precocious youngsters, with many making a positive tangible impact for the Wasps' fortunes in the process. This season is no exception, with the additions of Taylor Steven (on loan from St Johnstone), Ally Roy (loaned from East Kilbride), Bobby Wales (borrowed from Kilmarnock) and Ethan Sutherland (a temporary addition from St Mirren) all being productive in Alloa's campaign. In-fact, it could be argued that this season's crop have contributed the most to

the Wasps cause, accounting for almost 40% of the total goals Alloa have scored so far this season. That's the equal highest proportion of goals in any of the past two decades, as the table in this article demonstrates.

Taylor Steven is rightly receiving plaudits for his recent electric form, contributing seven goals and seven assists from his previous eleven games (up to last weekend's encounter with Edinburgh City), or seven goals and five assists from his previous eight games if you prefer. Whichever metric you measure it by, these numbers are seriously impressive and testament to Taylor's hard work and determination to make real progress during his loan spell.

It's the kind of form that will surely grab the attention of his Saints manager Craig Levein, who must be delighted at the benefits this loan has had for all parties. Taylor is at the time of writing equal top scorer this season with another loanee, Bobby Wales.

The 18-year old's first loan has gone very well, with him leading the line with such skill that it has been reported to be garnering interest from teams down south and even across the continent (Torino in Italy) too. Wales's purple patch of eight goals in ten matches was a great reward after doing everything but score in his first eight appearances for the club. In the past, Alloa have typically sought loan signings

who have already experienced a loan deal elsewhere (e.g. Taylor Steven was on loan at East Fife last season), as it offers a degree of protection for the Wasps that the player already knows the routine of being a loan player, which shouldn't be underestimated, often combining full-time training back at their parent clubs and fitting in training sessions with Alloa too. However, the Wasps took a calculated risk on being Wales' first loan club, with all parties again reaping the benefits of this deal. Bobby's international commitments with the Scotland U19 team means he is scheduled to be absent today. swapping Clackmannanshire with the delights of north-east Italy, but he should be back next weekend to springboard Alloa's attack for the remainder of the season. Wales' form has been a joy to watch at times, with his ability to turn away from defenders and score a variety of goals being particularly enjoyable. I'm sure all Alloa fans will hope that Bobby joins a conveyor-belt of highly promising strikers to have passed through the Recs on the way to the top level of the game. with Wales surely being able to be mentioned in the same bracket as Stevie May and Ross Stewart, who have both won full international honours after starring for the Wasps.

Alloa's latest loan signing Ethan Sutherland has shown considerable promise in his appearances down the left-hand side after joining from St Mirren in January. It is hard to believe the player is only 17 years old, with his agility, trickery and fine delivery all adding to Alloa's considerable attacking threat. Being so young means, I think he plays without fear and his blistering pace means even if he does



make an error, he more often than not can recover the situation. Andy Graham's put a lot of trust in the youngster, playing him either at left-back or further forward, with Ethan repaying his manager's faith with a goal and three assists in eight appearances up to last weekend.

Finally, Ally Roy is not your typical loan signing, having jumped up two divisions to join the Wasps from East Kilbride in September. At 26 years old, Roy's age doesn't fit with your typical loan capture either, but the Wasps do have form in this type of signing, with there being parallels with Allan Maitland's loan signing of Brian Carrigan from Linlithgow Rose back in 2009. Like Roy, Carrigan had spent the entirety of his career at higher levels of the game before dropping down toythe juniors. Given that pedigree it was not a particular jump for either player to return back to the senior ranks with the Wasps. Carrigan also had a previous connection with Maitland, with the pair enjoying considerable success together at Clyde a decade earlier. Maitland turned 'Carrots' loan into a permanent signing in the summer of

2009, but fitness concerns meant even Maitland lost patience with the talented forward midway through the subsequent season. Roy has had a strange time of it in an Alloa shirt, beginning on fire by scoring in each of his first four appearances – the first Alloa player to do so for 58 years, emulating David Keddie's incredible achievement back in 1965. But since then a change in shape of the Alloa formation under new manager Andy Graham has limited Roy's game time, although he's still looked dangerous when coming off the bench in recent months.

The current quartet of loan signings have collectively contributed twenty-two goals so far this season (and 13 assists), which is four short of the highest total during an individual Alloa season in the past two decades. That record is currently held by the crop of loanees from the promotion winning 2017/18 season, which included a double figure return from Ross Stewart and seven goals from Jordan Kirkpatrick, with the St Mirren duo both popping up when it mattered most on that memorable promotion winning afternoon at the Rock



versus Dumbarton. With the number of games remaining this season, I think it is likely that the class of 2023/24 will surpass that total in the coming weeks. Other seasons when loan signings have contributed heavily to Alloa's goals tally include 2011/12 (thanks to Stevie May's phenomenal form), 2018/19 when the Wasps were spoilt with the quality of loan signings in the form of lake Hastie. Conor Shields, match-winner Dario Zanatta, defender Sam Roscoe and late season additions of Jack Hamilton and Jack Aitchison (who has been playing regularly for Gary Caldwell's Exeter City in League One this season and is still only 23 years old!) and 2021/22 (Euan Henderson's 17 goals being the main contributor that season).

At the other end of the scale, there have been other seasons when loan players have contributed few or no goals, with none during the relegation 2010/11 season, single strikes from Javier Payo and Adam Coakley contributing to the 2006/7 & 07/8 seasons and just two goals contributing to the

goals tally under Peter Grant in the curtailed 2019/20 season. However, what goals they were that campaign, with Robbie Deas heroic injury time header earning Alloa an amazing point in a crazy 4-4 draw at Morton and Lee Connelly scoring the opener in Alloa's final game before lockdown (a satisfying 2-0 win over Inverness). That's not to say Alloa loanees didn't contribute heavily to Alloa's successes that season, with goalkeeper Jamie MacDonald proving to be a tremendous emergency loan signing and Crystal Palace youngster Scott Banks performance in that final match before football stopped going down in folklore as one of the finest individual performances by any Alloa player for many a year.

The loan system is really working well for the Wasps in recent years. If a club gains a reputation for being a good place for youngsters to learn their trade, it has a snowball effect in helping attract future players in later seasons. The Wasps have certainly benefited in that regard, with Alloa's time in the Championship being another factor in that regard in being trusted with some top

young talent being tested at that level of the game.

The loan market can also be helpful to the Wasps in attracting future permanent signings. There are countless examples where young players are in the last year of their contracts and already realistically know that they'll be moving on in the summer. Hence, a loan move can act as an audition in becoming a bona fide Alloa player, with Ross MacIver and David Devine being the two most recent examples of this. Historic cases include Ross County pair Michael Bolochoweckyj and Chris Townsley, Morton's Adam Coakley, Hamilton's Declan McAvov and Airdrie's Stuart Noble, who all turned loan deals into permanent contracts with Alloa. Sometimes there is a delay in that re-connection occurring, with young loanees returning later in their careers, with the positive experience of that earlier spell probably contributing to that decision to return to Clackmannanshire. Examples in this category include current Wasp Luke Donnelly (who had a couple of months working under lack Ross and then Jim Goodwin back in 2016, whilst on loan from Celtic, before returning to the Recs permanently in 2022), Tony Stevenson, Mitch Megginson and Robert Thomson. The prospect of Stevie May returning to the Wasps to bookend his career and add to his 19 goals in 22 games from 2011/12 (which helped Alloa to the Third Division title. seeing May pick up the divisional player of the year award in the process) would be sensational! Who knows, perhaps the teenage trio of Steven, Wales and Sutherland may return to Alloa one day after successful careers at the higher end of the game too?!

LAYING TO REST AN OLD FRIEND

A hush fell over the Recs as the Tullibody Pipe Band began to play the Flowers of the Forest. Lined up in front of the stand were the players of Alloa and Stenhousemuir, the home team wearing black armbands in tribute to a fallen comrade. With the club flag at half-mast, fans bowed their heads as the old lament played. Stalwart Alloa winger Jock Stirling had played in the previous home game, bringing his usual bag of tricks to torment the King's

Park defence in a hard fought local derby. Just two weeks later Stirling was gone. He had been buried in Alva Cemetery on the morning of the match, two days after his death in the Western Infirmary in Glasgow. Alloa players and directors formed part of the funeral cortege on that March 1924 morning, with wreaths coming from Middlesbrough and other clubs that Stirling had served. He had played at the highest level in Scotland and England before coming to

Alloa in the autumn of his career and helping to inspire the Wasps to a golden era. The crowd gathered in the cemetery reflected Jock Stirling's standing in the Wee County, where he had put down roots even before signing for Alloa.


John Campbell Stirling had been born in Milton of Campsie in 1886 to Robert, an engineer from Glasgow, and Ann, a Gaelic speaking Fraser from Invernesshire who had gone south to work as a domestic servant. lock had grown up in Old Kilpatrick where he found employment as a teenager as a boilermaker's helper. The youngster was already making a name for himself in the local football scene too. His form for Clydebank Juniors didn't go unnoticed with Stirling playing a trial for Rangers before getting his big break with Clyde in 1908, the Daily Record reporting that: "Last night Mr A.S. Maley, the Shawfield manager, visited Clydebank and secured the signature of John Stirling of the local junior club. He is a reputed firstclass shot for goal and was wanted by several clubs". Stirling wasn't daunted by the step up and was soon tipped for a Scotland call up. He ended the 1909/10 season by playing in an epic Scottish Cup Final between Clyde and Dundee. Black

and white ribbons were being tied to the trophy in the closing minutes with the Bully Wee 2-0 up when Dundee staged a remarkable comeback, the cup ultimately going back to Dens after a second replay.

A year later lock was on the move to Middlesbrough, the English First Division club paying a 'substantial fee' to take him south. But that wasn't the only significant event in Stirling's life that summer. On the 11th July 1911 he married Elizabeth Thomson in her home town of Alva. The couple would eventually settle in the Wee County but first to Teeside where lock was soon a key player. Elizabeth didn't settle so quickly, a report during that first season noting that she had "not taken kindly to the climate in the North of England and has been forced to return to Scotland to recuperate". Stirling himself was flying, his form earning a place in the Anglo-Scots team for the international trial, with reports suggested that he would have been called up for Scotland but for an injury sustained in the match. His bad luck continued when he was forced to withdraw from the Anglos squad after being selected again in 1913, and although he played in the 1914 match in a 2-2 draw, a Scotland cap would continue to elude him

Jock's form in a Middlesbrough side which finished third in the league in 1913/14 would attract a bid from Manchester City. While Boro were able to hold onto their flying Scotsman on this occasion, Stirling was on his way in the summer of 1914 with a £2000 move to newly promoted Bradford Park Avenue. The transfer was said to have come like "a bolt from the blue" for disappointed Middlesbrough supporters, but Bradford were aiming high on their elevation to the top flight and there was a further attraction for lock in the shape of their Scottish manager Tom Maley. Tom was part of a footballing dynasty: a brother of Alex, the man who had taken lock from Clydebank luniors to Clyde. and of the famous Celtic manager Willie. There was a strong Scottish influence at BPA where Maley had even changed the club's shirt to green and white hoops, and among lock's new teammates was the Sauchie born former Alloa striker Jimmy Bauchop. While Stirling would do well for Park Avenue – a winner at Stamford Bridge among his highlights - wider world events were overtaking him. On the same newspaper pages as reports of his transfer were headlines about 'British soldiers on the move'. lock would manage one full season before the English League went into cold storage in 1915 as war raged in Europe. Stirling returned home to work in Scotland and found time to turn out for Clydebank and Third Lanark.

The war deprived lock of four seasons when he might well have been at his prime. He returned to England on the resumption of competitive football in 1919, first with Stoke before switching mid-campaign to Coventry City, where the local paper proclaimed his acquisition as being "among the most important of the season". Instead lock was soon on the transfer list. In the summer of 1920 he returned north to sign for Central League Alloa, the press reporting that he was "currently residing in the Alloa district". He had actually been based in Clackmannanshire for some time and Elizabeth had given birth to their daughter Mary in Alva in 1918. Perhaps that was the real reason for lock's short spells at Stoke and Coventry: his heart was really back in the Wee County. Signing for the Wasps meant his days as a full-time footballer were over and the 1921 census lists him working at Alloa docks as a motor attendant for the Forth Shipbuilding and Engineering Company.



lock Stirling still had plenty to offer on the park and he had arrived at Alloa at the dawn of a golden era for the Wasps. The team would embark on an epic Scottish Cup run in 1920/21, defeating First Divison Falkirk and Clydebank over seven ties. They weren't finished there, giving Rangers an almighty fright in a 0-0 draw at Ibrox where lock "showed that he was far from done". The adventure came to an end in the replay but "wonderful Alloa" had caught the attention of the football world. Come the end of the season the club were elected to the Scottish League where they would go on to make history by claiming the title at the first attempt. Willie Crilley grabbed all the headlines with his 48 league goals but the experience of old heads like Bobby Orrock and Jock Stirling were crucial ingredients in Alloa's success. And so it was that lock, on the cusp of his 36th birthday, made an unexpected return to Scotland's top flight. He still had it and was on the scoresheet in two of Alloa's six top flight wins, the team eventually falling just short in their attempt to retain First Divison status.

Jock was one of the few remaining links to the great Alloa teams of the early 20s in the much changed side of 1923/24. His form helped the floundering Wasps just about keep their heads above water. He was on target in a pre Christmas clash

with eventual champions St Johnstone, the Perthshire Advertiser noting that he had outshone young Saints attacker Jimmy Fleming, the darling of the home crowd and future Scotland international: "The dangerous man in attack was Jock Stirling, who must have been playing football at a time when Fleming was a tiny toddler. Although shorn of some locks, Stirling is still a very useful winger". His final appearance came on March 1st 1924, creating a guilt edged chance in the derby against King's Park with "a beauty of a cross". He was named to face Cowdenbeath the following week but rather than entertaining the crowd at Central Park, Jock Stirling was undergoing surgery at the Western Infirmary. He died on Thursday March 13th 1924. While some reports would suggest a link with an injury sustained against King's Park, the death certificate confirms he died from tuberculosis. "Footballers everywhere will regret to learn that John Stirling, the Alloa forward, died at an early hour this morning.... he had an honourable career as a player", said the press. Just two days later the Alloa players gathered in Alva Cemetery to say their final goodbyes, before the Wasps took to the field at the Recs that afternoon and honoured their departed friend by putting some recent wretched form behind them to defeat high flying Stenhousemuir 2-1.

On the eve of 100 years since Jock Stirling's death I

made my way to Alva, passing his old home on Stirling Street before laying flowers at his grave at the foot of Ben Cleuch. I followed in his footsteps at the site of the Alloa docks then walked down Clackmannan Road to where he entertained the football fans of the Wee County. Jock would scarcely recognise the Alloa shore and Recs of 2024. but on a cold March afternoon the Wasps of the present day turned on a thrilling display of attacking football. Kelty Hearts had no answer to the pace and trickery of Taylor Steven, Quinn Coulson, Ethan Sutherland and Steven Buchanan as they tortured the Fifers on the flanks. lock Stirling would have approved.

A FAN'S VIEW

With an aggregate score of 9-4 favoring Alloa since our last game, it's surprisingly been a mixed bag of results.

First up, and looking to bounce back from the thrilling (but ultimately fruitless) defeat at Montrose, was Kelty Hearts' visit to the Indodrill Stadium. Kelty had dropped precipitously out of the playoff race since Ianuary, and Alloa put them to the sword with one of the most complete performances of the season. Taylor Steven continued the fine form that saw him pick up the February Player of the Month award and drilled in a low shot within twelve minutes. The youngster also had a decisive hand in the second goal after cutting inside and curling a left-footed cross from the right. Kurtis Roberts had to make the

barest of contacts just six yards out to nab his second goal in three games. Botti Biabi then had a moment of madness as he hauled Scott Taggart down in the box. The Alloa captain converted, only for the referee to order a retake due to encroaching into the Kelty box. However, the Alloa captain continued unabashed and picked the opposite corner, sending goalkeeper Kyle Gourlay the wrong way for good measure. Tochukwu Ogayi, in his first appearance in 2024, had a very easy day, and the confident Wasps' only gripe on the day was that the game wasn't more comprehensively wrapped up after cutting the traveling Fifers open at will.

After Kelty, Alloa made the trip to the capital to face Edinburgh City. The Citizens

were looking to prolong their League 1 status for at least a week, as not bettering Annan's result would officially relegate them to League 2 in the fastest relegation ever in the SPFL era. Alloa did look like sowing that up early as Taylor Steven found the cross to an unmarked Luke Donnelly, and the striker produced a classy finish past Ruaridh Adams. There was, however, some fight left in the old dog for Edinburgh, and they gradually denied any potential Alloa attacks while growing more and more confident in opening up the Wasps. Malik Zaid would gain a deserved equalizer after Kelsey Ewen's delivery was backheeled and volleyed to him, and he made space dribbling past Taggart to shoot low across Morrison's goal and nestle the ball into the bottom corner. Edinburgh would continue the charge and reap dividends when Frankie Deane reacted fastest to a tackle which sent the ball across the box. He trickily spun Taggart and rolled his shot into the bottom corner from 8 yards. Alloa would not continue to be frustrated though, as they finally made it up the Edinburgh end, and while a corner scramble erupted in the box, Luke Donnelly was judged to have been kicked in the box. Contact looked especially slight but enough for the referee to blow the whistle for Scott Taggart to attempt from the spot. He calmly slotted home for Alloa to equalize. The Alloa captain would grab the first brace of his career after ghosting in at the back post and meeting an uncontested Ethan Sutherland delivery. The Captain headed home confidently. sending Alloa back into the lead. Taylor Steven would then extend the lead with a pinpoint driven effort from outside the box after a lovely Alloa passage of play, and Bobby Wales would force an own goal to make it five after crossing to Callum Pitt. The Edinburgh defender deflected the ball into his own net after a robust chest. That completed a game of two halves as Edinburgh ran out of steam and ran out of hope of retaining League status.

While Kelty at home was the complete performance and Edinburgh was a game of two halves, Kelty away would prove to be a comedown from the recent high spirits and free-flowing football the Wasps have become accustomed to in recent weeks. Kelty themselves had been dragged into relegation playoff contention with Annan continuing to collect points


in recent weeks. There were no fewer stakes for the Wasps who could extend their grip on the playoffs and potentially go four and seven points ahead of rivals Montrose and Cove Rangers, respectively.

That pressure seemed to weigh on Alloa, who were without Bobby Wales due to his inclusion in the Scotland U19's Euro's qualification campaign. Conor Sammon came in to replace the youngster and struggled for service all evening. Kelty passed up three or four golden opportunities as they looked to end a recent goal drought, but despite the one-way traffic of attacks, they would not find the opener. That honor would fall to Cameron O'Donnell, who converted the one bit of quality Alloa created all night. After a succession of Alloa corners, Wasps' center-back Morgyn Neill, of all people, would loft a wonderful cross onto the edge of the six-yard box, and the Alloa full-back easily directed his unmarked header into the top corner past Kyle Gourlay. With that unlikely equalizer in hand, surely it would spur the Wasps to come to life in the final thirty-five minutes. However, it was Keltv who would eventually scrap for an equalizer. Joe McGlynn, on

loan from Hamilton, managed to turn goalwards and unleash a shot into Kurtis Roberts. The contact off the Alloa midfielder created a wicked spin to deflect into the bottom corner of PI Morrison's goal. It was no less than the home side deserved after dominating the game in terms of passes and chances created. Misfortune again would strike the Wasps late on as Michael Tidser, who had earlier escaped an obvious red card after dangerously leading with an elbow in a jump with Kurtis Roberts, misfired a shot into defender Tam O'Ware. The former Queen's Park coach would almost airswipe his first effort, which neatly landed to set him up for a toe poke into the bottom corner while one vs. one with the Alloa goalkeeper. Alloa failed to make any other attempts on Gourlay's goal and meekly surrendered the three points in what has become a rare off day.

Hopefully, that result is put to bed against a Queen of the South team that are toiling themselves and without a win since the end of January and we can get back to celebrating an exciting and lethal Aloa team. Enjoy the game.





LOOKING BACK 25TH MARCH 1989

In The Premier Division, leaders Rangers maintained their four-point advantage, thanks to a 1-0 win at fifth-placed Hibs, second-placed Aberdeen kept up their own title challenge with a 3-1 victory at St. Mirren, while at Celtic Park, third-placed Celtic overcame a Dundee United side lying one place below them by 1-0. At the foot of the table, rock-bottom Hamilton Accies rather inevitable fate was just about confirmed following a 0-1 home defeat by Hearts, while in "the basement battle" at Dens Park, second-bottom Dundee hosted a Motherwell side who lav just one place above them. And a 2-1 victory for The Dee

enabled them to exchange places with their fellow strugglers, and also ended a run of six straight league defeats.

First Division table-toppers Dunfermline had to settle for a point from a 0-0 home draw with relegation-haunted Kilmarnock, and as such their lead was reduced slightly to three points over second-placed Airdrie, who overcame another of the front-runners, Morton, by 2-1 at Broomfield, Third-placed Falkirk were 1-0 winners in their top-of-the-table clash at Clydebank, who still remained fourth in spite of this setback. St. Johnstone were now fifth after a 3-1 home win v luckless

Queen Of The South, who were now winless in eleven league games. Telfer The Doonhamers scorer, while Morton's defeat saw them drop one place from fifth to sixth. Rock-bottom Oueen Of The South's fate was now sealed, but the battle to avoid the second relegation spot involved several clubs. And Clyde, gameless due to the cancellation of their home clash with Glasgow rivals Partick, remained in second-bottom spot, but Kilmarnock's valuable point moved them up one place, Killie were replaced in third-bottom position by Meadowbank, 1-2 losers at Forfar.


Albion Rovers moved ever-closer to promotion/The Second Division title, thanks to a 2-1 win at bottom club Stenhousemuir, the win extending The Wee Rovers advantage to seven points over Brechin, who remained in second place, in spite of a 0-1 defeat at Angus rivals Montrose. Oueen's Park's point from a 1-1 home draw with Arbroath, was still sufficient to nudge them up into third position in place of Stirling Albion, who dropped to fifth after a 0-3 defeat at East Fife. who thus moved up into fourth spot. Alloa meantime, remained sixth and still in contention for

promotion, thanks to a 2-1 home win v Cowdenbeath. Mungo Mc-Callum with a second-half brace was on target for The Wasps, who'd lined up as follows: Ronnie Lowrie, Larry Haggart, Robert Lee, Andy Millen, Keith McCulloch, John Gibson, Peter Lamont (Leslie Conlin), Alan Rodgers, Mungo McCallum, Ian Lee, Charlie Lytwyn.

Down in England, First Division leaders Arsenal's 3-1 win at Southampton moved them six points clear of second-placed Norwich, who were rather surprisingly beaten 0-2 at home by relegation-haunted Newcastle, though The Canaries did have two games in hand. Millwall remained third,

despite being held 1-1 at Everton, while West Ham, in spite of a 1-0 success at fellow strugglers Aston Villa, still propped up the table.

Chelsea moved seven points clear at the top of The Second Division, Manchester City still retained second spot despite being held 3-3 at seemingly-doomed Walsall, while WBA's point from a 0-0 draw at another of the promotion challengers, Swindon, saw them move into third spot in place of Blackburn, who'd been held 1-1 at Lancashire rivals Oldham the previous day, and who now slipped to fourth.

Since that move he has gone in to play for Dumbarton, St Mirren, Dundee, Falkirk, Ayr, and of course, Oueen's on two occasions. Offering support to both the defence and attack in his anchoring role in midfield, Todd is one of the stand-outs in the visiting team. Previous boss, Gibson, saw his leadership traits too by making him captain at the start of the season. This season he has



contributed at both ends of the park, chipping in with a couple of goals but more notably 5 assists for his side.

ONE TO WATCH - LEE CONNELLY

Today's man to keep an eye on for Alloa's defence is a familiar face in Lee Connelly. The dynamic forward spent time on loan at the club from Sunderland either side of Covid. Known for his trickery, skill, and goal prowess, he has been a handful for Alloa and other opponents plenty in the past. Connelly got on the scoresheet the last time these sides met at Palmerston in a 1-1 draw. Building on from that goal, he has scored 4 goals this season, as well as 2 assists. Despite being behind on goal tally to the likes of Gavin Reilly, who sits on 13, Connelly has always impressed against Alloa and caught the attention of those watching on.

THE CONNECTION

As well as the connection of Lee Connelly between the clubs, there is another returning player for Queen of the South in the form o Daniel Church. The left back has played 13 times this season following his move from the Indodrill in the summer. It has been a season plagued with injury, similar to the end of his Alloa career. However, Church

ALLOA ATHLETIC WALKING FOOTBALL

The Alloa Athletic walking football section was started in 2017 by a few hardy souls who had played football earlier in their lives and wanted to try a modified return to the beautiful game.

By 2018 Alloa Athletic Walking Football had joined Walking Football Scotland which is the lead charity organisation for walking football in Scotland. This helped give the sessions and games structure along with rules and introduced the Alloa teams to competitive games against other clubs across Scotland.

Walking football grew in popularity across Scotland. Alloa also experienced an increase in numbers with more people coming along to give it a try. Alloa continued to develop in parallel with Walking Football Scotland.

Age groups were introduced for tournaments which are now held for over 50s, over 60s, and over 70s, for men and over 40s, for ladies.

Alloa Athletic have also taken part in tournaments abroad with some success.

Walking Football has a few differences from traditional football:

The pitch size is approx. 60% the size of an 11 a side pitch. The goal area is also proportionally smaller.

There are a few rules in Walking Football which are not used

in the 11 a side game.

- 1) No Running every running offence is an indirect free kick a total of 3 team running offences is a penalty kick.
- 2) Walking football is a 3 touches game. A 4th touch is an indirect freekick
- 3) the ball must stay below crossbar height.
- 4) outfield players are not allowed in the goalkeeper's area
- 5) Goalkeepers are not allowed outside their area

Surveys of walking football have identified certain benefits for those taking part.

Physical Benefits – Improved health and fitness, improved balance, weight loss, improved core stability.


Mental health benefits – Increased positivity, improved mood, improved self-esteem, improved confidence.

Social benefits – Meet new friends, opportunities to socialise, reduced isolation, increased quality of life.

Health benefits – Less visits to GP, reduce medication, Healthy body healthy mind, better quality of life. For women, it was noted that sessions were an opportunity to discuss menopausal issues with teammates.

Currently Alloa Athletic Walking Football hold 3 sessions a week: Mon, Wed, Fri, from 10.00 to 11.00 at the Indodrill Stadium for anyone aged 50 or over. Each session begins with a coordinated warm up, stretches and ball work before games. This is essential in an attempt to help reduced pulls and tears.
